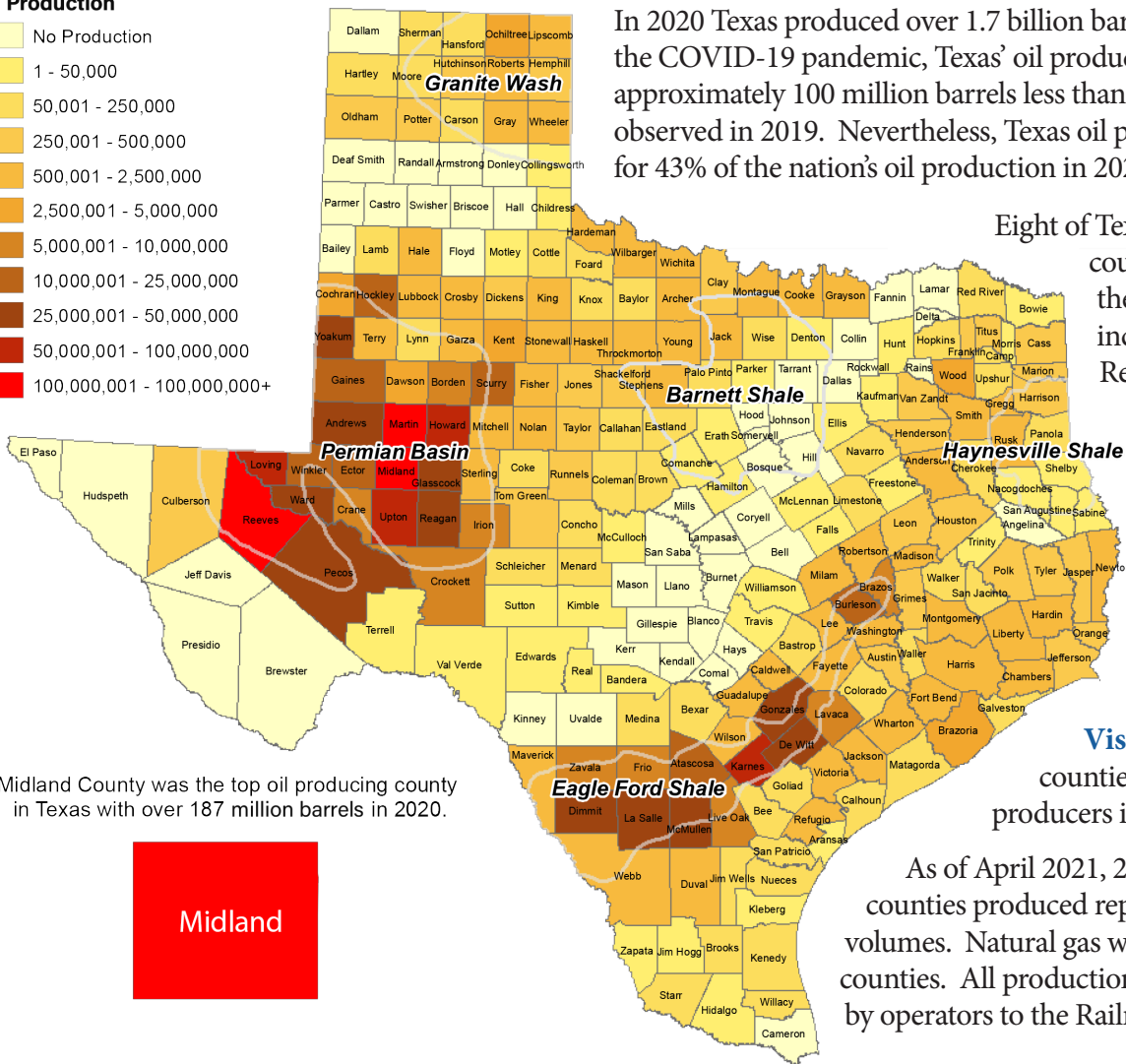
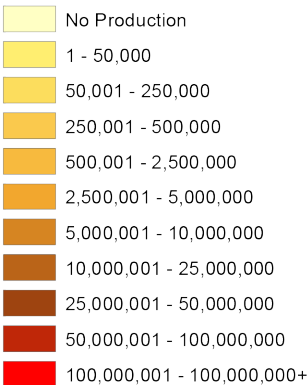

## 2020 Texas Oil Production by County

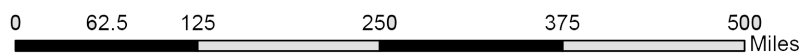
### Oil Production



In 2020 Texas produced over 1.7 billion barrels of oil. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, Texas' oil production in 2020 was approximately 100 million barrels less than production levels observed in 2019. Nevertheless, Texas oil production accounted for 43% of the nation's oil production in 2020.

Eight of Texas' top ten oil producing counties in 2020 are within the Permian Basin. These include Midland, Martin, Reeves, Howard, Loving, Upton, Glasscock, and Ward counties. The other two top producing counties, Karnes and La Salle, are within the Eagle Ford Shale. According to RRC's Oil & Gas Production Data Visualization page, these counties remain as Texas' top producers in 2021.

Midland County was the top oil producing county in Texas with over 187 million barrels in 2020.
